1.1 INTRODUCTION

INTRODUCTION

The district of Shivamogga, situated at the centre of the state of Karnataka is quite vibrant of district as far as political, literary, cultural, theatre and film activities are concerned. The district is known for its rich flora and fauna. Kannada literature has bagged the highest number of jnanapeetha Awards. Out of 08, 02 awardees are from Shivamogga district. The district also has the pride of giving 04 Chief Ministers. That apart the district has made an indelible mark by contributing much to the Vachana Literature. Places like Jog falls (World famous waterfalls) and Agumbe (known for highest rainfall and picturesque sunset) are situated at a distance of 100 Km from Shivamogga Town.

National Education Society. (R.), Shimoga was established in 1946 by the leading citizens of Shivamogga, consisting of many freedom fighters with the main objective of serving the cause of education for the children of this Malnad region.

National Education Society started its educational activity by opening a High School in 1946 and now it is managing 42 Educational institutions.

About the College:

Kamala Nehru Memorial National College for Women, first College for women in the entire district at the under graduate level, was started in 1965 with just 27 students studying in B.A. The foundation stone of the college was laid by Sri.Lal Bahadur Shastri (Former Prime Minister) in the year 1965 and the new building was inaugurated by the Rastrakavi Sri. Kuvempu (poet laureate of Karnataka) in the year 1975. It is affiliated to the Kuvempu University.

We are proud to say that, the college has been securing ranks every year. Securing ranks has become a routine affair which is the reflection of our commitment to academic excellence. The college went for the first accreditation in 2004 and it was accredited at the 'B' Grade with 73 scores. In the second accreditation in 2015 it was accredited at the 'B' Grade with 2.35 CGPA.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

The programs and course of the institution are affiliated to the Kuvempu University. The college collects feedback from stakeholders for improving the quality of education. The college caters to diverse needs of learners by identifying and counseling the slow learners. The college has significant contributions in extension activities and institutional responsibility. The college has enough physical facilities, library sources and ICT facilities. The college provides student insurance, book bank, computers, broad band internet connection and Xerox facilities and encourages sports and cultural activities. A sales counter is a recent addition which caters to the stationery needs of the students. The institution strongly believes in the concept of self audit. Pursuit of excellence and constant renewal help for further improvement. The strengths of the institution are:

1. Our management is dynamic and supportive and participative.
2. The college earned good reputation as a safe place for women education. Women from all sections seek admission to our college.
3. The location of the college is its strength. A large number of girls from in and around the city take admission to the college.
4. ICT enabled class rooms and one ICT enabled auditorium.
5. e-.Library with CDs, for students and staff.
6. Facilities for indoor games and Gym.

7. College canteen with hygienic food at reasonable price.
8. Well qualified competent and experienced teachers.
9. Implementation of e-governance in the area of planning, examination, student's admission, finance and accounts and administration etc.
10. Midday meal is provided for the students who come from far distant villages and poor students with subsidized price.
11. Varied cultural activities is the strength of our college. Hence the college is often called '**the cultural hub**' of the city.
12. Fee concession for meritorious students.
13. Another strength of our college is, 'Earn while you Learn. The college has introduced five certificate courses:
 - a. Organic Phenol and Soap making
 - b. Mehendi Art
 - c. Fabric Painting.
 - d. Beautician courses
 - e. Embroidery.
14. Well equipped hostel facility is available for students.
15. All Departments have their own subject forums to expose the students academically.

Institutional Weakness

1. The campus area is limited to 4175.06 Sqmts. Hence, there is less scope for further expansion of the institution.
2. Space provided for sports at college campus is not enough. The institution can make use of the sports field maintained by the management.
3. Lack of extended campus to open PG courses.
4. Less opportunity and scope to avail government funded projects.

Institutional Opportunity

1. In the academic front, some opportunities can be explored and exploited to the optimal level. Both the teachers and the management can think of utilizing the UGC grants available Under various heading, particularly to start add on courses. The college can apply for the status of 'College with Potential' for Excellence.
2. Since the location of the College provides easy access to all, self financed certificate courses can be started, in the areas such as Fine Arts, Beautician Courses, Fashion Designing, Embroidery, Fabric Painting, Soap Making, Mehendi Art etc.
3. P.G. Courses like M.Com and M.A., may be started for which present library and sister institution buildings are adequate. Self financing new combinations with Journalism, Creative Writing and Fine Arts can be started in B.A. course.
4. More participation in university academic activities.
5. To make better use of ICT facilities particularly the computer lab through starting computer training programme for students.
6. To conduct more soft skill, life skill, and personality development training programme for students.
7. To conduct training programme for teaching and non-teaching staff of the institution.
8. To undertake more MOU's with various organization and training centre for the benefits of the students.
9. To enhance environment protection activities by planting more saplings in around the campus.
10. A training center for competitive examination can be started.
11. A training centre for fine Arts like, music, dance, painting, and theatre....can be started.

Institutional Challenge

1. The institution is facing some challenges / threats owing to the pressures of the society and the latest trends in the job market. There is general apathy to B.A. course leading to gradual decline in the admission to B.A. programme. In addition to this, a number of government colleges are being opened every year even in the remote areas of the district. Hence the catchment area to admission becomes narrow and limited. This is a big threat to our college.
2. The Grant-in-aid appointment both for teaching and non teaching vacant posts or for the new vacancies is not made. It may be difficult to run the college on self finance basis. However, the institution responds to these challenges so that our Vision and Mission can be accomplished.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Though the curricular design and development are formed by the affiliating university, the institution plays a significant role in the process. Every year, two or three senior faculty members are in the Board of Studies or Board of Examinations and they take active part in designing the syllabus, in preparing the question paper pattern or in preparing the text book. In the year 2019-22 five senior faculty members worked as chairmen of Board of Examinations. At present English, Kannada and Urdu faculty are on text book committee. The HOD of English has been preparing English Work Book for the students for the past ten years. In the past, our principals were in the Academic Council of the University and played an important role in the decision making related to academic matters. One of the faculty members has been on the CDC and Affiliation Committee for the last three years. The English and Commerce departments have conducted one day workshop/Faculty improvement programme in the current academic year for the college teachers and for the non teaching staff on English for Communication. IQAC has conducted one day workshop for the teachers and staff on NAAC new guidelines. The Department of Political Science conducted one day state level seminar on **Parliament V/S Judiciary in India** in the year of 2017-18. During 2019-20 three faculty improvement programmes have been conducted.

The institution also obtains feedback from students, employees and other stake holders to review and redesign the curriculum. The skill development work for B.COM students has proved fruitful. There is some academic flexibility for Commerce teachers with regard to Skill Development projects.

During the current year the following certificate courses are introduced:

1. 'Earn while Learn'
2. Organic Phenol and Soap making
3. Mehendi Art
4. Fabric Painting.
5. Beautician course
6. Embroidery,
7. English for Communication

Each combination in BA Course has English medium and Kannada medium. The institution has continued the certificate course in Tailoring and Fashion Designing and spoken English under self finance scheme. Feedback collected from all stakeholders, analyzed and action is taken accordingly.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The institution has a transparent admission process. It is in accordance with the government and University rules and regulations and guidelines. Admission committee is constituted in the beginning of every academic year. The committee discusses the norms of the admission as per the reservation policy of the government and the University. The College Governing Council also discusses the fee-structure of the management and

admission is made purely on the basis of merit cum reservation.

Advanced and remedial classes for slow learners and SC/ST students are being conducted every year and given additional library books and they will be involved in organizing departmental seminars, workshops and programmes.

The slow learner and advanced learners are identified on the basis of the student performance and special strategies are adopted to overcome the learning barriers. Talented learners will also be deputed to various academic programmes in and around the city. Students in the department of Kannada and English run a weekly wall magazine on their own initiative. Visits to historical places, field surveys, text related film shows are conducted to enhance the learning experience. The department wise mentorship is allotted to continue the student centric learning approach. The current year mentor mentee ration is ; 36:1.

During 2016-17 the Dept. of English conducted a unique exhibition “**best out of waste**”. Students from different schools and colleges visited the exhibition. State level student seminar was organized by the dept. of Commerce.

In the current academic year nine professors have doctoral degree and three have M.Phil degree. Apart from chalk-talk method, audio visual tools are used. Group discussion, interactions, student seminars and project works are done to make the teaching effective and fruitful. Students’ appraisal of teachers is done annually. Redressal Cell attends to the students’ examinations related / institute related grievances. The course out comes, curriculum development and execution, innovative and student centric teaching methodologies are decided on the basis student feedback.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college has conducted one state level seminar and two workshops during the last five years. There were about 18 permanent faculty members. In the current year there are only 11 faculty members. Out of 11 full time teachers, 07 are PhD holders and three have M Phil degree. Almost all guest lecturers have appeared for NET or SLET exams and a few of them have completed successfully. A six guest lecturers have Ph.D degrees.

A Research committee has been constituted and an appeal made to the Kuvempu University to recognize the college as the research center. Some teachers have presented research papers at International, National and State level seminars. Commerce teachers keep on giving field survey projects to students as a part of academic activity. Dr. Onkarappa A.P Dept. of Political Science published one text book with ISBN recognition. He has published articles in state level conference and national seminar. The articles of many others have appeared in regional language newspapers and journals. Dr.H.S.Nagabhushan, principal has edited a number of text books in English and has authored two books on NGugi Wa Thiango and Tamil writer Bama.

The College is known for extension activities. Apart from NSS, Sports activities, YRC, Rotaract club and the Rangers Club have done commendable achievements. Karnataka Red Cross Society has admired our YRC as the best in the University. In the past three years, one student has represented the college at the National Republic Day parade at New Delhi. One from sports section has attended south zone Kabbadi tournament.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has adequate infrastructure facilities to run the academic and administrative programmes. There are twenty class rooms which are well ventilated, spacious and adequately furnished. There are three smart class rooms with LAN/ICT facilities. There is one big hall with a measurement of 2100 Sqft multimedia facility to conduct regular programmes.

The college has a well furnished library building having good number of books, journals and Newspapers. Library has open access system and it is fully automated. More than thirty two thousand titles and sixty journals are available for the use and there is a well maintained computer lab with well furnished ICT tools. There are 40 computers in the computer lab to train the students. The college has IT facilities with Wi-Fi with broad band. A handcam, Camera, scanner, internet are provided.

Parking facility, canteen, separate room for IQAC, Ladies waiting room, multigym and a sales counter are other facilities for the benefit of students and the staff. As security measures to students, the height of the compound wall is increased and eight CCTV Camara are installed. To maintain cleanliness and hygiene, pad burning machine and pad vending machine have been installed at wash rooms. New toilets for men and women have been constructed. Generators are new additions to the physical infrastructure. The college hostel is three storied which can accommodate 310 students.

NSS, Tailoring class and counseling centre have separate rooms. The College Office, Principal's Chamber and the staff room and IQAC are housed in the ground floor of the building. The Building Committee and Library Committee are constituted to monitor and inform the management to fulfill the infrastructure needs from time to time. The institution has developed infrastructure utilizing the UGC grants, and the management fund.

Student Support and Progression

We are proud to say that the college has been producing excellent results both in B.A. and B.Com. Degrees. The percentage ranges from 85% to 95% and in some subjects the percentage is between 98% to 100%. Financial assistance is given to meritorious and reservation category students by means of scholarships and freeships. Other category students are benefitted from poor student fund. Career Guidance Cell, Women Empowerment Cell and Grievance Redressal Cell address the various needs of students. Remedial classes for SC/ST and slow learners are conducted. The Management encourages University and National level players/achievers by offering financial support. The cultural association conducts talent day every year to select the talented students to depute them to different competitions.

'Annapoorna' mid day meal to deserving students. One Hundred Twenty Students are beneficiaries. Study circle has been created for the last five years for improving result. It helped the college to attain ranks. Special attention has been paid to those students by giving extra books from library and giving assignments, notes and special coaching etc. The Career Guidance Cell in association with other colleges of the Management arranges programmes related to the art of facing interviews, self grooming, preparation of CV and public speaking. The institution deputes students to various student centric workshops which are being conducted in different colleges.

The students are encouraged to participate in NSS and NCC activities. Two Students have participated in the State and National level R.D Parade. 'Nudisiri', Kannada wall magazine and 'Litwrite', English wall

magazines are the forums for students to develop their literary and intellectual abilities. In addition, the Dept. of Economics and the Dept. of Political Science also bring out wall magazines regularly. 'Arogyapatha', works for the general health and counseling needs of the students.

A unique event called **VASANTHOSTAVA** is celebrated in our college every year to promote our culture and heritage.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The Institution is proud to have the supportive management and the governing council. From the very beginning the Management is governed by educational values and ideals. The Management also includes the senior staff members whenever there are programmes conducted by the management. University level and State level Sports meet and cultural competitions are conducted with the financial assistance. Infrastructure facilities is looked after by the management. The management takes personal interest in the maintenance of the college campus. Mid-Day meal is sponsored by the Management. The management is transparent in all matters. The UGC funds, the college fund and the management funds are spent following all the norms. There are two level audits:

1. The Management audit.
2. The Government audit.

The concern of the Management for quality can be seen in its mechanism of monitoring the administrative process. A member of the executive committee has been nominated to look after the day to day administration. The college organization structure ensures a system of decentralized and participative management whereby information flow and decision-making process involves management, staff and students. The management annually verifies the progress of the institution in all matters. This process is done before its general body meeting. Thus, the institution has the participative management which is committed to quality and excellence.

The college has number of cells such as, student council, admission committee, Grievance Redressal Cell, Women Empowerment Committee, Youth Red Cross (YRC) the Rotaract Club and the Rangers Unit of Scouts and Guides which are working for the students welfare and their personality development, provide exposure to students to varied experience and opportunities. For faculty enhancement, the college has conducted more than two workshops. The college has IQAC which regularly reviews the functioning of teaching learning process across the institution in different programmes. IQAC incorporates SWOT analysis of the entire quality system which is the key aspect. It works rigorously to intensify curricular aspects with value added certificate course, enrichment programmes, feedback analysis and review, to promote research projects, increase number of Ph.D.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The institution is committed to all round development of the students, particularly through gender equity initiated programmes. The College has taken keen interest in providing facilities such as, safety and security, counseling and ladies waiting room. Annapoorna mid day meal with subsidized rate was introduced for couple of years. But is suspended due to pandemic guidelines. It has created a positive impact on the functioning of the college. Installation of eight CCTV boosted the self confidence of the students. Formation of garden committee to maintain the campus has a positive impact. The members of the committee monitor the cleaning of the campus every day. The college has been conducting certain programmes towards waste management, green

campus, rainwater harvesting and plastic free campus and green audit is conducted. The institution provides ramp facility for the physically challenged. The institution organized number of programmes for promoting universal values, national values, human values and national integration during last five years. Special attention is being paid for slow learners. At the same time there is a study circle for the students who excel in academics

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

The multidisciplinary approach proposed in National Education Policy in Higher Education for the holistic development of a student is agreeable. The college is trying to inculcate the method in all the disciplines to bring curriculum integration. The Multidisciplinary Undergraduate Program may help in the improvement of all the educational outcomes, with a flexible and imaginative curricular approach. The program provides for both breadth and depth in diverse areas of knowledge. A range of courses is offered with a rigorous exposure to multiple disciplines specializing in one or two areas. The program fulfills knowledge, vocational, professional and skill requirements alongside humanities and arts, social, physical and life sciences, mathematics, sports, etc.. The curriculum combines conceptual knowledge with practical engagement and understanding that is relevant to the real world application which is applied through practical laboratory work, field work, internships, seminars, workshops and research projects. The institution is focusing on incorporating key skills like critical thinking, problem solving and soft skills to enable students to heighten the level of skill based learning. Certain courses are common to all students which contribute to the breadth of study. The faculty is adopting a new mode of evaluation in learning assessment is more dynamic and enquiry based one. Multidisciplinary approach helps in enhancing logical development and analytical learning through practical situations which helps in promoting over-all growth of students and transfer the current education system that focuses on multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary learning. The areas of specialization which the students are required to choose are two disciplines or subjects called 'major' and an area of the additional discipline called 'minor'. Students gain deep disciplinary knowledge through theory and practical experiences in their area of specialization. They gain a reasonable understanding of the area of additional study that they choose. Students can choose subject combinations across 'streams'. Our institution has adopted the directives from the affiliating university and has introduced B.A, and B.Com courses. The flexibility in the current programme is made known to students. <p>2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):</p>	<p>The New Education policy is focused on individual development by providing flexibility in the course structure through Academic bank of credits. A 'credit transfer' mechanism is adopted in our institution to facilitate the students to choose their learning path to attain a degree, working on the principle of multiple entry and exit at anytime, anywhere and any level of learning. The learning outcomes like increased creativity, innovation, higher order thinking skills and critical analysis will enable to generate Academic bank of credits of students. This further helps in flexibility in curriculum across several higher education disciplines and institutions. The college facilitates multiple exit and entry option for students providing credit accumulation through the facility created by the academic bank of credits scheme in the "Academic bank account" open for students across the country to transfer and consolidate the credits earned by them by undergoing courses in any of the eligible Higher Education institution. The university may adopt SWAYAM courses for the benefit of the students. A student will have the option to earn credit by completing quality assured MOOC programs offered on the SWAYAM portal or any other online educational platform approved by UGC from time to time. The college uploads its report annually on its website, a report of its activities. ABC addresses the grievances of students. The students have to complete courses equivalent to a minimum of 48 credits for certificate at the successful completion of first year (two semesters) of 4 years multidisciplinary UG degree program. 96 credits for a diploma at the successful completion of the second year (4 semesters) of four years multidisciplinary UG degree program. 140 credits to become eligible for the regular Bachelor's degree, 180 credits to become eligible for the Bachelor degree with Honors. The students shall be required to earn at least 50% of the credits from the Higher Education institution awarding the degree or diploma or certificate. Our college will create a record of academic bank of credits to facilitate students to exit and enter at different levels in accordance with the provisions of NEP. This information will be communicated to the</p>

	<p>affiliating university for further course of action like issue of certificate, approval of admission, provision for assessment etc. The institution will create adequate academic space for entry of students from other institutions at subsequent time.</p>
<p>3. Skill development:</p>	<p>Learning is complete and holistic only when a student is able to perform his/her responsibilities and duties towards self. Learning Skills, Life Skills and Literary Skills are introduced in our institution. According to a series of knowledge, skills and aptitude, the college organizes many skill enhancement framework courses. Skill development programs can form the benchmarks for various education and training courses to match with the job requirements. The life skills amongst students deepen the impact to unlock the potential. Skill development includes ability to take initiative, ability to solve problems, ability to interact with one another, ability to manage, conflict and ability to understand and follow instructions. Skill development includes global awareness, financial, economic, business, civic literacy, health literacy and environmental literacy. Many skill development courses like yoga and wellness, literature, drama, singing, meditation etc are given more importance. Yoga encompasses physical, mental and spiritual practices. The ancient Indian texts like the Vedas and Upanishads are enriched with the principles of living a healthy life. Through literature, the students can communicate feelings, opinions, ideas, habit and other experiences. Drama can provide a platform for self-expression, developing empathy and practicing skills in life like situations. Singing is a form of expression of thoughts, ideas and feelings which is more effective than plain speech. Meditation makes students reduce stress, improves memory, concentration and encourages compassion. These skill development tools are adopted in our institution for the enhancement of student knowledge. Subjects like Computer Applications, Communicative English and many other subjects are introduced from time to time.</p>

Students online time can be used innovatively for making online sessions more effective and interesting. 2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

Experiential Learning:

- The students have been active in organizing varied co-curricular activities to learn the vivid facets of the subjects they study. They also take part in various competitions and fests conducted by other colleges to expose them to innovative and creative approaches to learning.
- Experts from various walks of life and achievers are invited to share their experiences and to guide the students. Eminent from art, literature, theatre, commerce, politics, films are invited to address the students on various occasions.

- Students are given assignments, asked to collect data, visit related work areas etc. to widen their knowledge and experience. This kind of firsthand experience helps the students to interact with their peers effectively. It also helps them to realize the crux of a situation.
- Students are taken to educational excursions and industrial visits. Text based theatre performances are done every year both in English and Kannada. Text based film screening enhances their understanding of the text. Students are also asked to make PPT Presentation on the topics which are prescribed in the syllabus.
- Senior students are also given opportunities to teach their juniors in the class room. This student - teacher concept gives them abundant academic inputs.

Participative Learning:-

- Students are made into groups of 5-6 to prepare notes on the prescribed syllabus. Each group is given a topic and they work together to collect the information. They refer books, consult teachers and browse the net to prepare notes. They learn that the teaching is not one sided and they too have a role to play. This group activity helps them to interact with each other and to share the notes and information with other groups.
- The college follows the academic curriculum prescribed by the University. The curriculum encourages the student centered learning approaches which include usage of ICT, field surveys, seminars, group discussions, competitions, add on courses, stage performances etc.,

Problem Solving Methodologies:-

- Regular assignments, class seminars, objective type questionnaire, extra classes etc., held regularly keep the students lively and competitive.
- Special lectures / demonstration buildup their confidence and widen their capabilities.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

Response:-

Mechanism of Internal Assessment (IA) is quite transparent.

The college follows the parameters set by the Kuvempu University in all subjects. The process of IA is made clear to all students during the orientation programme. An IA test committee is formed every year which looks after conducting the IA tests. Two IA tests are conducted, answer scripts are corrected and marks are awarded. Students write answers in the answer booklets supplied by the University. Each paper is thoroughly evaluated by the teachers and the valued answer booklets are given to students to go through their answer and marks awarded. Any mistake pointed out by the student in the valuation is corrected. Average marks of the two tests are displayed on the notice board and the students are asked to notice the marks and to intimate the concerned teachers/office staff if they find any mistake. Absentees with genuine reasons (like medical, participation in sports/cultural competitions) are given one more opportunity to write the IA test.

The IA test committee announces the test time table well in advance. In subjects like Economics, Sociology, English and Commerce IA marks are also awarded for assignments, submission of workbooks and skill development records. This is done as per the University orders.

The evaluation branch of the university sends a draft copy of the exam time table well in advance. Any grievance like clash of dates and subjects received by the students is communicated to the concerned authorities and set right the grievance.

Any information related to exams is displayed on the notice board. Change of dates or postponement of exams are communicated to students through SMS. There is a separate office establishment and personnel to look after the exam related activities. The exam committee in the college allots the exam duty to the staff and sees that the exams run smoothly. Sitting arrangements and invigilation duties are allotted as per the University guidelines. An external sitting observer and the visiting squads are appointed by the University to check any possible malpractice and to look after the hassle free and peaceful exam process.

The IA test committee conducts two IA tests in each semester and the third test is conducted for the absentees. The time table for the IA test is announced well in advance to give enough time for the students to get prepared. The IA test committee also acts as internal squad to check any possible malpractice. The

evaluation work is quite transparent wherein the valued scripts are given to concerned students to verify the marks awarded. Any mistake in the valuation is brought to the notice of teacher and set right the mistakes.

The IA tests are conducted with all seriousness, just like the University exam. Students of different subjects and streams are mixed in the sitting arrangement to avoid any possible malpractice.

University Exams:-

The University after the valuation process, announces the result through the website. Any discrepancy in the marks card is informed to the university and set right the discrepancies.

Subject and paper wise analysis of the results are made and copies are sent to the Management to bring to their notice. Any fall in the result percentage is brought to the notice of the concerned faculty. They in turn look into the problem and change the strategy to improve the results.

2.6.1 Teachers and students are aware of the stated Programme and course outcomes of the Programmes offered by the institution.

Response:

Course and programme out comes are essential factors in developing the outlines of teaching and learning. A course outcome facilitates clarity about the course expectations for up-keeping the process of learning. Course out comes help the learner to understand the reason for perusing the course and help them to identity what they will be able to do at the end of the course. This aims at integrating the knowledge and skills which they acquire in a particular unit of the course. Further this kind of knowledge and skills help them to communicate their need for comfort and trust relationships with others. They openly express their feeling and ideas in their interactions with others in the society. The course enhanced skill development, employment opportunities and also inculcates the gender, environment, human values and ethics among the learners. These outcomes are incorporated by an academic council while structuring programme outcomes and course outcomes.

The college offers many programmes in Arts and Commerce. The learning outcomes of the various courses are built into the curriculum at the Kuvempu University website and the same has been posted to the institution. At the commencement of every semester, the principal holds a meeting where all the faculty members discuss about program objectives and out comes. Course objectives, about syllabus, teaching plan and its achievements, exams and evaluation. The main objective of the meeting is to discuss how to achieve all the specified outcomes mentioned in the syllabus. The role of library in achieving these out comes is also a significant factor. It is updated regularly with required books according to the syllabus and

faculty recommendations.

At first fresh applicants get sufficient information from college website regarding programmes offered and course availability. Applicants are given proper guidance on course outcomes by teaching and non-teaching staff at the time of admission.

It is mandatory for every fresh student to attend an orientation programme at the college and the programme outcomes are explained to the students in detail. Faculty members make presentations related to his / her subject. The coordinators / conveners of various units / clubs also make presentations. Students are made to understand the outcomes of both curricular and co-curricular activities. Things are made clear when the students seek clarifications. At the beginning of the semester the faculty articulates the learning outcomes and programme outcomes to the learners. The students are also informed about the broad objectives, pedagogical practices, various modes of evaluations like test, presentations, seminars, assignments, quiz, unit test etc. For the overall programme as well as each course paper. The alumna of the college also help the students by sharing their learning experience and career paths so that the present students are motivated.

LIBRARY: FULLY AUTOMATED COMPUTER SYSTEM (DIGITAL LIBRARY):

The college Library has the Open Access System. All books are bar-coded. Books are issued to students, faculty members. 2 books are given to each student for 15 days. Apart from this, two more books are given to the students for each semester under the Book Bank Scheme. In addition to the above, books are also given to SC and ST students for their studies. Additional books are given to the students who are in the 'Study Circle'. Old students and students pursuing higher education are allowed to use the library for reference. The books are issued to both teachers and students through manual and computer system. Every year books worth Rs.1,00,000/- is added to the library. Separate registers are maintained for students and faculty members. Old students, faculty, public and retired college staff donate book shelves and books to the library. In addition to the above, the books are used by the candidates who are appearing for various Competitive Examinations, like IAS, KAS, PSI, PDO, FDA, SDA, etc.,

Other facilities such as Xerox, computers with wi-fi and internet, suggestion box etc., are available in the library. Previous question papers are properly maintained. News papers (both in Kannada and English) Journals, bounded journals, books for competitive examinations, University News, etc., are also available in the Library. Library is property maintained by the staff.

This mismanagement of Solid waste led to open dumping and overburdening of landfill areas with significant environmental and public health issues. This phenomenon has been noticed by our college management and administration with the passage of time. As preservation of environment is our primary duty, due emphasis has been laid to waste management in our institution. The Institution has given much importance for cleanliness and waste management in all the class rooms and entire college campus. College inserted dust bins in all class rooms, corridors and in strategic places in college campus. Arrangement has been made to clean corridors office room and class rooms. Similarly college campus has been kept clean by sweeping in the early hours of the day. The waste thus procured is collected in a particular bin and shifted to the carriage of city Municipal Corporation. It helps open up mindsets of the people by listening to different perspectives and views as well as interpretations of the art. It encourages thoughtful conversation and the understanding that there is more than one approach for everything.
